Remnants of the Rails: A Journal of Illinois Railroad Depots

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This journal series is dedicated to my husband, Patrick J. Twigg; and my parents, Robert and Helen Nugent.

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Introduction

Remnants of the Rails is a journal series that documents the remaining railroad depots of Illinois. The purpose of the journal is to promote the preservation of these depots; each edition features depots from different rail lines, geographic locations, and stages of preservation or decay.

Photography for this project began in the mid-1980s and continues through the current day. All photographs in this series have been taken by Mary Nugent Twigg; photos after 2007 are digital.

The journals are organized into chapter sections by the depot's status, according to the following classifications:

- **Restored / Museums** (purpose of the depot is now a museum)
- **Converted** (now in use by a business or other entity)
- Active (currently being used for passenger or freight services)
- Abandoned / Inactive (no longer in use)

Each journal features depots from the following geographic areas of Illinois:

- **Northern**(towns and cities north of I-80)
- Central (towns and cities between I-80 and I-70)
- Southern(towns and cities south of I-70).

In recent years, the general trend has been to preserve and restore the state's abandoned depots. Largely, this has been through the grassroots efforts of local towns and historical societies. In other instances, private owners and industries have led the effort to convert the depots into businesses, and thereby save these historic structures. Where possible, "before and after" restoration photos are included. Sadly, some depots that were previously saved are now facing decay due to a lack of maintenance. The photos in this journal series capture it all - from the abandoned to the restored - offering a historical snapshot of depots of Illinois.

I have always enjoyed trains and traveling for as long as I can remember. Both of my grandfathers, Nugent and McMahon, were street car drivers on the Chicago Surface Lines, and my father and uncle were motormen for the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA). As a youngster I lived near the old Chicago, Aurora & Elgin (CA&E) and Chicago & North Western (C&NW) lines, as well as the Proviso Freight Yard. As I grew up, the CA&E line disappeared and was replaced by the Illinois Prairie Path - an early model of the "rails to trails" hiking and biking paths. I remember seeing one of the last steam trains at the Hillside Quarry in the late 1970s and knew that the old trains and old ways were quickly vanishing.

The impetus for this project came in the 1980s when a friend mentioned that the railroad companies were tearing out the old depots. My reaction was that I just *had* to photograph the remaining stations. After visiting the restored Chattanooga, Tennessee, depot I was inspired to capture the spirit and place of a people in transit. Even though the focus of this project is only Illinois stations, the scope of this venture has turned out larger than initially imagined. It has taken nearly a quarter century to document Illinois' depots.

A number of people have assisted with various aspects of this project throughout the years. I am thankful for the encouragement of friends, especially in the early days when the "end of the line" seemed far down the track. Many weekends have been filled with "railroad research" trips and I'd like to thank those who have joined me, including: Charlie Lewis, Anne Farnham, Patty Harrington Velasco, Francis and Virginia Holley, Bob McGarry, and especially my husband Patrick Twigg - who has seen countless miles of railroad tracks over the years. 



My heart is warm with the friends I make, And better friends I'll not be knowing, Yet there isn't a train I would not take, No matter where it's going.














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
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










Top: South side of depot (2010) note the roof decay and missing "Wilmington" sign since the 1991 photo. Bottom: North side of depot (2010).
